About Us

GRNC was established in 2003 and is one of the leading charitable organisations in the UK run by the Nepali Community living in Rushmoor. GRNC has been the mainstay in providing help, advice and support to those in need in the Nepalese community and helping new arrivals (veterans, their dependents and widows) around Rushmoor to settle successfully by collaborating closely with the Gurkha Welfare Advice Centre, Rushmoor Borough Council and other relevant local and regional organisations and agencies. After the immigration rule in favour of the Gurkha veterans to settle in the UK were granted in 2004 for post 1997 Gurkhas and in May 2009 for pre 1997 Gurkhas, many of them decided to settle in Rushmoor area due to the legacy of serving Gurkha battalion being stationed in Church Crookham, Fleet from 1971 to 2002. The Nepali people in Rushmoor predominantly consist of veterans, their families and widows who have chosen Rushmoor to be their home making it one of the highest densely populated area in the UK for Nepali diaspora. With an estimated number of around 13,000 Nepali settled in Rushmoor, it makes up about 12 per cent of its population. GRNC has been working closely with the local council, Citizens Advice Rushmoor, local community groups and charity organisations to help integration, community cooperation and harmony.

This role is being funded by The National Lottery Community Fund for 2 years.
